

# RAWA Update



The following letter was sent to various representatives in support of RAWA.

We are writing to express our support for H.R. 2773, the Recovering America's Wildlife Act. This bipartisan bill, introduced in Congress in April by Rep. Debbie Dingell and Rep. Jeff Fortenberry would dedicate \$1.4 billion annually for state fish and wildlife agencies and tribes to implement proactive, voluntary, and incentive-based conservation of imperiled species.

Despite the remarkable diversity of fish and wildlife in the U.S., populations of many species are in decline. Freshwater animals have been particularly hard hit and approximately 40 percent of the nation's freshwater fish species are now rare or imperiled. Similarly, an astonishing three-quarters of the nation's freshwater mussel species are imperiled or vulnerable. Emerging diseases, invasive species, habitat loss, and extreme weather threaten many fish and wildlife populations at a scale inconceivable just a few decades ago. Proactive conservation can reverse this trend and keep species from becoming endangered.

At the request of Congress, every state has developed a State Wildlife Action Plan (SWAP) to assess the health of their state's fish and wildlife and outline conservation actions necessary to sustain them. Collectively, these action plans have identified 12,000 species of greatest conservation need and formed a nationwide strategy to prevent them from becoming endangered. However, the current federal State Wildlife Grants program is funded at only a fraction of what states need to conserve these species. This bill would provide the funding to implement 75% of every state's SWAP.

# RAWA Update



In Wisconsin, this bill would provide funding to conserve a combined total of 20 endangered and threatened fish species. This bill would also provide funding to conserve a combined total of 19 endangered and threatened Wisconsin mussel species. Endangered fish species in Wisconsin that will benefit from this bill include skipjack herring, crystal darter, gravel chub, bluntnose darter, starhead topminnow, goldeye, pallid shiner, striped shiner, black redhorse and slender madtom. Threatened fish species that will benefit in Wisconsin include blue sucker, black buffalo, longear sunfish, redbfin shiner, shoal chub, river redhorse, pugnose shiner, ozark minnow, gilt darter and paddlefish. Endangered Wisconsin mussel species include spectaclecase, purple wartyback, butterfly, elephant-ear, snuffbox, ebonyshell, higgins eye, yellow/slough sandshell, sheepsnose, winged mapleleaf and rainbow. Threatened Wisconsin mussel species that will benefit from this bill include the slippershell mussel, rock-pocketbook, monkeyface, wartyback, salamander, buckhorn, fawnsfoot and ellipse mussel species.

Wisconsin is home to over 15,000 inland lakes, 44,000 miles of rivers and streams, 800 miles of Great Lakes shoreline and 250 miles of Mississippi River frontage. Protecting and enhancing the habitat in Wisconsin is critical to conserving the abundance and diversity of fish and mussel species.

Proactive conservation is good for wildlife, good for taxpayers, and good for business. **We ask that you please consider co-sponsoring this important piece of legislation.**

The Wisconsin Chapter of the American Fisheries Society is one of the most active chapters in the nation and actively promotes the science that supports the conservation of our fish species.


# 2021 Photo Fishing Contest Fall Update

As of October 12<sup>th</sup>, the annual WI-AFS Photo Fishing Contest has been a bit lack luster for submissions this year, but the race has been hot with rising stars of the past few contests, Stefan Tucker and Matt Kornis head to head with 8 points each. Gilly is hot on their tails with 7 points as well. To date, a measly 27 species of fish have been registered. Reigning champion Brandon Wambach has had a dismal showing this year *with only 1 point* to his name thus far after his 28 points last year. Lots of time left and more submissions are still coming in and many species left to be caught still! With many species left to be claimed, there is plenty of opportunity for anyone to come out on top!

# 2021 Photo Fishing Contest Fall Update

## Fishing report from Brandon:

*Yes, I've been fishing. I've been out just haven't targeted the small species "micro-fishing" like I did last year. Lots of fish to be had as of late. Fall salmon season is winding down for me with duck/goose hunting, deer hunting, fall walleye fishing, fall bluegill/crappie, and of course some steelhead starting to show up in the Lake Michigan tributaries around me as well. Fall is always too short and my favorite time of the year for the outdoors (that and the cooler weather is much nicer!). River walleyes are finally pushing up stream and putting on the fall feedbag after our prolonged summer-like weather of September. Target them closer to dams or in/near rivers that feed lakes this time of year as they push shallower or upstream in search of bait-fish. The same cooler weather is the reason that bluegills and crappies are moving shallower into channels/ditches or shallow weedlines. Fall chinook salmon are spawning and coho are really starting to show up in the Great Lake tribs with a few steelhead following in behind them and brown trout should be really starting to show up more over the next few weeks. It's a fun time of year and if you ever want a few pointers on any of these things I'm normally willing to help (but secret fishing holes will not be discussed!). If it's about musky or bass fishing... don't bother asking me, I just don't target them much. Good Luck and Tight Lines! Keep those photos coming!*



# 2021 AFS Photo Fishing Contest Info and Rules

Contest details and rules are as follows:

**Who can participate?:** All WI AFS members. Note: You must have **paid your dues** for that year to submit entries.

**How long does the contest run?:** The contest will be **open year round** and will start after the AFS Chapter meeting on Feb 6, 2020 and officially end **2 weeks prior** to the WI AFS Meeting in 2021 (Feb 7-10).

**What fish qualify?:** Any fish caught legally (within an open season, not in refuges) with hook and line methods and from **public waters of Wisconsin** will be eligible for entry. This includes WI portions of Lake Michigan and Superior and border rivers such as the Mississippi, St. Croix, St. Louis, and Menomonie in stretches where they border WI. Any species of fish can be entered (point system discussed below). **Fish caught while working (when you are on the clock) or for the purpose of research do not count.**

**How do I enter a fish?:** **All submissions must consist of a photograph of the angler and the fish** (“fish selfies” are acceptable). For very small fish, a second close-up photo that does not include the angler is suggested for species verification. **Each submitted fish must include a measured length** (down to the half or tenth inch OR mm) and the location of catch (this can be as simple as “Vilas County Lake” if you don’t want to give up a honey-hole, but you need to at least include county). This will predominantly be an honor system, but a photograph of the fish on a measuring board may be submitted if the angler chooses and these photos may be used in tie-breaker situations. The contest administrator reserves the right to call B.S. or the right to convene a panel of B.S. experts to review submissions.

**Scoring:** ANY species of fish can be submitted. The angler possessing the largest specimen of any species will be awarded a minimum of 1 point. The angler who holds the largest specimen for the following high-profile species will receive 3 points: Largemouth bass, smallmouth bass, walleye, muskellunge, northern pike, black crappie, bluegill, yellow perch, channel catfish, flathead catfish, and pumpkinseed. We will award 2 points each for the largest inland and Great Lakes (+ tributaries) catch for brown trout, lake trout, rainbow trout, and brook trout. Once a bigger specimen is caught by another angler, the points for that species transfer to the new angler. Identifiable hybrids including tiger musky, tiger trout, saugeye, and splake will count as a unique species (panfish or minnow hybrids will not). In the case of a legitimate tie, points will be awarded to both anglers for that species. The angler with the most points at the end of the contest will be declared the winner.

Awards will be presented at the annual meeting.
